His nickname for me was Gobot and he knew exactly which program to run to make me work. I'd like to thank my Ozanam coach Mr. Rufus Brown for planting seeds for success in me that I've passed on to the players I've coached for the past 25 years.

Mr. Carl Kohlman

Anyone who knows Ozanam knows Mr. Kohlman. I would consider Mr. Kohlman the Father of AAU basketball in the Pittsburgh area. Although, Mr. Kohlman had kids of his own, he managed to make every Ozanam athlete feel like part of his family. Mr. Kohlman was famous for the hoagie sale that helped families cut the cost of AAU travel expenses. I can still smell that Italian dressing. Mr. Kohlman was more than the Director of Ozanam. He was a Father figure and role model for every athlete that passed through Ozanam's doors. Thank you, Mr. Kohlman for your legacy of love that I carry with me when I teach young people today.

The Competition

If you grew up in Pittsburgh during the 1970's and 80's and considered yourself a Hooper or Baller (modern day vernacular), you got no respect until you proved yourself at Ozanam. The ETW Stars, the Archerettes and the Rockettes were the top three girls' basketball teams in the city of Pittsburgh. I played for Rufus and the Rockettes. Our colors were purple and gold. We were flashy just like our coach. The ETW Stars were an elite team coached by Eddie Wilson and his band of brothers. The Archerettes were coached by John Kinsel, a referee who once fouled me out in the first half of a city league game, just to prove a point. That's how intense the rivalry had become. The players that led these teams would parlay their summer league success into outstanding careers at the collegiate level.

Karen Hall went to play for UNLV. Lisa Falloon played at Penn State University and Dionne Morris took her talent to WVU. I have only named a few of the who's who of Ozanam basketball Hall of Famers. Names like Stacey Williams would put fear into the hearts



Q. HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN A PART OF OZANAM? A. 34 Years

Q. WAS OZANAM A "GAME CHANGER" IN YOUR CHILD-HOOD DEVELOPMENT?

A. Most definitely. It was an escape from the streets of the Hill District. A place where we could go finish our homework. Use a computer if we didn't have one at home when most of us didn't have a calculator at home. It was a very holistic program that taught me so much. I learned the Lord's Prayer by saying it before every basketball game playing for Zonk 5 from 14-under on up. I learned that there were great players from all over the country because the incoming freshman for the local colleges and universities played OZANAM. I also learned there is a great big world outside of the Hill through traveling AAU with OZANAM.

Q. WHAT IS YOUR ROLE WITH OZANAM TODAY? A. *I sit on the Board of Directors*.

Q. OZANAM SPANS FOUR-DECADES, HOW HAVE YOU SEEN OZANAM GROW?

A. I've lived and participated through what could be called the Golden Years of OZ because OZ was more than a place it was a culture of excellence. I believe that when it left the Hill and the games were played at Mellon some people lost the connection with OZ that Darelle Porter (Executive Director) and the board is slowly but surely bringing back to the area. OZANAM is a brand that everyone in western PA know and respect.

Q. WHAT ARE MEMORIES THAT RESONATE WITH YOU ABOUT YOUR OZANAM EXPERIENCE?

A. Just the lessons learned and the people you meet. I didn't know that Caucasians could really play and play well to where they are respected and remembered to this day all around the city. It also taught me about brotherhood and racial equality. Before OZANAM I didn't have Caucasian friends. Do you know how many meals Mr. and Mrs. Boris (Parents of OZ alums) served myself and Darelle? All the time we spent with alums Billy and Jules Caye? That would not have happen without OZANAM

Q. HOW IMPORTANT IS THE CULTURE OF OZANAM TO A COMMUNITY IN TODAY'S CLIMATE?

A. I think I mentioned it earlier it is very important. I believe it to be one of the most positive brands the city has ever had. It's important to let the families of not only the HILL know that OZ is alive and thriving but the rest of Western PA, because I guarantee that if a OZ alum see this newsletter they will want to help any way they can.

Q. HOW UNIQUE DO YOU CONSIDER A BOARD MADE UP OF OZANAM ALUMNI?

A. I believe that when you have a board made up of alumni then the best interest of OZANAM will always be the center of all decisions.

Q. HOW DOES OZANAM DIFFER FROM THE OZANAM OF YESTERDAY?

A. PlayStation and other video games. Most kids would rather sit in front of the TV and play basketball videos instead of going outside and pounding the blacktop.

Q. WHAT SETS OZANAM APART FROM OTHER PROGRAMS IN PITTSBURGH AND NATIONWIDE?

A. I don't know about the inner workings or traditions of other programs such as Kingsley center and Rucker Park in NY. The history of OZ is rich in integrity, competition, gamesmanship, and respect, so that is what I would say would and could set OZ apart from others.
